

- Net worth

 12/31/06; to a balance of 279,805

14.5% increase from 12/31/06 to
3/15/07; to a balance of \$320,392





FAMA Current Financial Position

- 2006 versus 2007 budget
 - Revenue 9.1% increase
 - Expenses 9.0% increase
 - Biggest changes (revenues and expenses)
 - Membership dues 5.6% increase
 - GAC 74.1% increase
 - Marketing 109.6% increase
 - McMahon project \$15,000



Treasurer's Comments

- Operationally, the budget (revenues and expenses) are under control
- What is a BIG DEAL...
 - Lack of FAMA membership involvement to affect our business model
 - Less than 20% of the membership filled out the recent GAC questionnaire regarding congressional relationships



Facts

- GAC expenditures have increased significantly from 2003 to 2007
- FIRE Act Grants play a significant role in our industry
 - Note: Senator Joe Lieberman's request for \$777 million for firefighters in the 2008 budget



We collectively carry the most influence, but we individually are not involved

Treasurer's Comments

- There is no financial link (revenues or expenses) to our 3-year strategic plan
- The Plan must be defined and there must be financial links if we are to become more effective
- Membership must keep us accountable

 2007 Goals – to update the bylaws as required – this year we have four amendments for approval at this meeting



Reporting Requirements (Cont'd.)

• 2007 Initiative

 To support the Board of Directors during the course of the year with opinions and interpretations of the bylaws as well as to develop the language necessary to amend the bylaws to reflect current practices.



Bylaws Amendment Process

 The Bylaws Committee prepares amendments with the Board's concurrence prior to submittal to the membership. For approval, the amendments must be published at least thirty (30) days prior to the next General Membership meeting. Approval is required by 2/3's of the member companies present and eligible to

vote, a quorum being present.



Amendment #1

 Section 6.7 Directors – Vacancies Currently Reads:

"Whenever any vacancy occurs on the Board of Directors by death, resignation, or otherwise, a replacement member shall be selected without undue delay by a majority vote by ballot of the remaining members of the Board present and voting at a special meeting called for that purpose."



Amendment #1 Rationale

 There needs to be an allowance for the vote to be held at a regular meeting as well as a special meeting. Also, the term "by ballot" requires a written vote. This is not the normal practice of the Board which is a verbal vote during a conference call, for example. Therefore, the term "by ballot" is recommended for removal.



Amendment #1 Proposed

Proposed to read:

"Whenever any vacancy occurs on the Board of Directors by death, resignation, or otherwise, a replacement member shall be selected without undue delay by a majority vote (by ballot) of the remaining members of the Board present and voting at its regular meeting or at a special meeting called for that purpose."



Amendment #2

 Section 6.8 Directors – Removal of Directors

Currently Reads:

"Any one or more of the directors may be removed either with or without cause, at any time, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any special meeting call for that purpose, a quorum being present."



Amendment #2 Rationale

 Need to better define "members" as the general membership and not the Board of Directors. Also need to make a provision for the vote to be taken at a General Membership meeting as well as a special meeting called for that purpose.





Amendment #2 Proposed

 Section 6.8 Directors – Removal of Directors

Proposed to Read:

"Any one or more of the directors may be removed either with or without cause, at any time, by a vote of two-thirds of the general membership present at its regular meeting or at a special meeting called for that purpose, a quorum being present."



Amendment #3

 Section 7.4 Officers – Vacancies Currently Reads:

"All vacancies in any office shall be filled by the Board of Directors without undue delay at its regular meeting or at a meeting specially called for that purpose. Any person appointed to fulfill a term vacated on the Board of Directors shall only be appointed for the balance of the vacated term and shall not become part of the automatic succession of officers in Section 8.2"



Amendment #3 Rationale

 It is necessary to clarify in the text that this section applies to the Officer positions on the Board of Directors only and does not apply to the Members at Large.



Amendment #3 Proposed

 "All vacancies in any office shall be filled by the Board of Directors without undue delay at its regular meeting or at a meeting specially called for that purpose. Any person appointed to fulfill an officer's term vacated on the Board of Directors shall be appointed only for the balance of the vacated term and shall not become part of the automatic succession of officers in Section 8.2"

Amendment #4

- Section 7.5 Officers Removal of Officers Currently Reads:
- "Any one or more of the officers may be removed either with or without cause, at any time, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any special meeting called for that purpose, a quorum being present."



Amendment #4 Rationale

 It is necessary to clearly define "member" as the "general membership" and not the Board of Directors. Further, an allowance should exist to permit the action to be taken at a general membership meeting and not just at a special meeting called for that purpose.



Amendment #4 Proposed

 "Any one or more of the officers may be removed either with or without cause, at any time, by a vote of two-thirds of the general membership present at its regular meeting or at any special meeting called for that purpose, a quorum being present."



Amendments to Consider

 Section 7.4.1 Presidential Vacancy requires that the Vice President succeed the question to be addressed is what to do if the VP who moved up to a vacated President's position cannot serve out the vacated term as President. Who becomes President at that time? The former President filling the VP slot at that time? ho serves the next Presidential term?




Fire Act Comments

- Significant delays in 2006 (released 47% of prior year)
- 88% of 2006 funds now released...
 - Apparatus is 27% of mix, consistent with 2005
- Administration of program shifting to FEMA
- NAPA study results unknown... anticipate -
 - Needs based funding for overall regional readiness, versus community
 - Increased risk analysis in the application process
 - All hazards focus with more emphasis on prevention
 - Measurable objectives
- Application process delayed... mixed views on when 2007 funding will begin to flow




Fire Act and SAFER Funding

What is a Rescue Pumper?

- Recently we were asked to provide a better definition for a rescue pumper.
- The following definition was submitted by P L Custom.



Rescue Pumper defined

- The term Rescue Pumper shall be applied to an emergency service motor vehicle that meets the following criteria:
 - The primary mission of a Rescue Pumper shall be as a Special Service Fire Apparatus in accordance with Chapter 10 of NFPA 1901 2003 edition. As a secondary mission, a pump will be installed on the truck. The purpose of the pump shall be to facilitate the primary mission by controlling small fires or washing down a scene.




Rescue Pumper specs

- Pump: A Class A rated pump of 250 gpm or larger.
- Tank: A minimum sized Water Tank of 250 gallons with Class B Foam capability for controlling Class B fires.
- Hose: A minimum of 400' of 11/2" hose.
- Hose Storage: The minimum required to store the amount of hose specified. This storage area shall be permanently mounted to the vehicle. If a ladder or other climbing device is required to access this storage, it shall be permanently attached to the vehicle.

Booked by Truck, by year



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

Shipped by Truck, by Year




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Total Shipments by Year w/US Pop.






APPARATUS SALES VS. SHIPPED BY QUARTER

Apparatus Sales vs. Shipped by Quarter







Historical Totals, Main by Quarter




FAMA HISTORICAL TOTALS


